Clear signage/information that under 18's are to be supervised and responsibility of parent/responsible adult at all times.

7) tea lights only to used with parental supervision if under 18. Otherwise risks of using tea lights explained to all adult participants and expectation that pumpkins will not be left with tea lights unattended. Note that the most common cause of domestic house fires is the use of candles in the home.

Vulnerability and Lone Working

Staff, volunteers or learners working alone must avoid compromising situations that may leave them vulnerable to allegations of inappropriate behavior, e.g. lone member of staff meeting a client in quiet location or transporting in own car.

Where these situations arise the risks must be assessed and suitable precautions put in place, e.g. meet in well-populated areas or drive only on main roads during daylight hours.

See *HS SIGN 4 – Personal Safety* for further guidance.

If interacting with young people the requirements of *HS – P 17 – Working Safely with Children and Other Vulnerable Groups* must also be followed and complied with.

Situations Where Lone Working is Not Permitted

Due to the level of risk a lone worker must never conduct certain types of work:

- Work on a ladder that can not be secured and which requires footing (GRA E02).
- Tree climbing and tree surgery.
- Work with learners or volunteers known (or suspected) to have a recent history of violence or abusive behaviour.
- Any other activity that is risk assessed as potentially high risk.
